# **New or Beginning Christians - Part 1**

#### Introduction

Welcome - If you are a new or beginning Christian, the best way to proceed is to read those Bible books written for New Christians. If possible, each section should be read daily for at least one week. (If you are a poor reader, get through the section at least once by reading or having someone read it to you. The other option is to listen to a CD of your preferred Translation.)

1 Timothy 3:16-17 states that the Scriptures are God Breathed and will equip a person for every good work they will ever do for the Lord. In John 8:30-36, Jesus said He will free a person from slavery to sin through His Word (teachings).

This study will follow the Biblical pattern of training new or beginning Christians. Remember that with God, your character has meaning and purpose, as it is to reflect the person of the Lord Jesus Christ!

Scripture references are from the <u>Geneva Standard Bible (GSB)</u><sup>2</sup> a publication of Reformation Quest, Inc.

Each student is encouraged to conduct periodic Greek and Hebrew word studies utilizing the Hebrew/Aramaic/Greek Word Study (Addendum #2a&b and Etymology www.etymonline.com) throughout the Bible Mastery Discipleship Program. Helpful resources would include a Bible Concordance and Lexicon (See Addendum #1 - How to Use a Concordance and Lexicon along with the Bible Hub website www.biblehub.com & Blue Letter Bible blueletterbible.org)

Ephesians 2:20 says, "And are [being] built upon (ἐποικοδομηθέντες³) the foundation (θεμελίω4) of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the Chief Cornerstone" (GSB); that is, their teaching in the Bible. This is your foundation.

Where to begin? 1 Peter 2:2-3 states: "As newborn babes desire desire (ἐπιποθήσατε<sup>5</sup>) the sincere<sup>6</sup> (ἄδολον<sup>7</sup>) milk (γάλα<sup>8</sup>) of the word<sup>9</sup>, that you may grow thereby: If so be that you have tasted how bountiful (αὐξηθῆτε<sup>10</sup>) the Lord is." (GSB) [For Context read 1 Peter 1:1 - 2:12]

When you have worked your way through Part 1 of the 10 WEEK 'NEW or BEGINNING CHRISTIANS' COURSE, then finish reading through the rest of the New Testament and then read the Old Testament. A Reading Guide is provided to help you stay on course. Put an "X" at the end of each section you complete.

This study will follow the Biblical pattern of training maturing Christians. Remember that with God, your character has meaning and purpose, as it is to reflect the person of the Lord Jesus Christ!

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# **Training Church Leaders - Part 3**

#### Introduction

1 Timothy 3:16-17 states that the Scriptures are God Breathed and will equip a person for every good work the will ever do for the Lord. In John 8:30-36, Jesus said He will free a person from slavery to sin through His Word (teachings).

This study will follow the Biblical pattern of training Church Leaders. Remember that with God, your character has meaning and purpose, as it is to reflect the person of the Lord Jesus Christ!

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Who is a Wise man endued with knowledge among you? Let him show by good conversation his works in meekness of wisdom. James 3:13 (GBS) [Read the entire Book of James for context].

# 1A. Leadership Training Introduction

- 1B. Church Leaders are always chosen because of their good character and faithfulness to their Lord. They are always chosen by other Leaders (not by themselves!). 1 Timothy 3; Titus 1
- 2B. Church Leaders must be leading! Doing nothing means a man is not leading and should resign any position he holds to let others lead. Still, when learning, the Disciples went WITH Jesus, only Listening at first, then Serving, then Outreach, and finally Leading others.
- 3B. Church Leaders need to know the Bible Basics first. Jesus did not teach the Disciples the Basics of the Bible! They already had that BEFORE being called to be Disciples. This study assumes you are familiar, as they were, with the Bible. A Church Leader should have read the entire Bible through as a start. After this, a mastery of the following Books will train a Church Leader by reading EACH section through DAILY for at least 2 weeks. This is done WHILE THEY SERVE!

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- 4B. This Study Guide will cover those Books of Scripture which describe the Selection of Church Leaders. No one Selects or Ordains Themselves, and even the Apostles Themselves are not exempt from being removed, says Galatians 1. Remember Judas!
- 5B. Leaders are Trained by Doing!
  - 1C. Leaders in Training should be with the Leaders who are already in Ministry positions. Watching and helping at first as the Disciples did.
  - 2C. They should be in the Church Board Meetings and Interacting; though without authority.
  - 3C. For two months their names should be posted, or made known to the Church, that they are being considered to be a Church Leader. This allows people to express any concerns they have about their character.
  - 4C. At the end of two months time they are simply confirmed. No one became a Church Leader in the Bible by voting.

[In reference to Deacons] Having the mystery (μυστήριον<sup>17</sup>) of Faith in pure (καθαρậ<sup>18</sup>) conscience (συνειδήσει<sup>19</sup>) And let them first be proved (δοκιμαζέσθωσαν<sup>20</sup>): then let them Minister, if they be found blameless (ἀνέγκλητοι<sup>21</sup>).

1 Timothy 3:9-10 (GSB)

# 2A. The Leadership Training Course

Read each section daily for at least one week. Focus on Leaders, Appointment or Leaders, Practices of the Church and What they Did and DID-Not Do!

1B. The Gospel of John

The Gospel for Christians. Answers Who, What, When, Where, Why and How for all, and should be Mastered by every Believer. Describes what Scriptures Do. What Jesus Does, what the Spirit Does and what Believers are to be doing. Instruction on who is obligated to what!

## 3A. Bible Studies

- 1B. Week 19: Church Finances
  - 1C. The Church spends money on:
    - 1D. Elders
    - 2D. Missionaries
    - 3D. Widows
      - 1E. Widows of those in Ministry and only when necessary.
      - 2E. 1 Timothy 5:3 (Honor = Support)
  - 2C. If people in your Church are Disciples they will support its ministries.

- 3C. A Church that does not pay its bills is an embarrassment to the name of Jesus and should apologize to those it owes, immediately fix the problem, and consider a change in leadership,
- 4C. In 1 Timothy 3, Leaders must have a good reputation in the community and "first be proven.")
- 5C. Study 2 Kings 4:7; Proverbs 3:9-10, 27-29; 1 Corinthians 9:1-27; 1 Timothy 5:18: Pastors are supported financially to "feed the sheep" (John 21), that is, to make sure that every Christian reaches maturity, Colossians 1:28 (Memorize this verse).
- 2B. Week 20: A Sinning Brother
  - Sin is a real responsibility for Church Leaders. If they do not deal with sin, then the Leaders themselves are sinning.
  - 2C. WRITE OUT the SPECIFIC STEPS to be taken by Leaders. Notice in 1 Corinthians 5, where you will destroy your Church if you neglect this.
  - 3C. Read also: Matthew 18; 1 Corinthians 4:14-5:13; 1 Timothy 5:19-25; Philemon (restoring a brother).
- 4A. New Testament Titles to Know Ephesians 4 (with emphasis on Ephesians 4:11-16)

"He therefore gave some to be Apostles, and some Prophets, and some Evangelists, and some Pastors and Teachers. For the gathering together<sup>22</sup> of the Saints, for the work of the Ministry, and for the edification of the Body of Christ. Till we all meet together (in the unity of faith and knowledge of the Son of God) unto a perfect man, and unto the measure of the age of the fulness of Christ. That we henceforth be no more children, wavering and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the deceit of men, and with craftiness, whereby they lay in wait to deceive. But let us follow the truth in love, and in all things, grow up into Him, which is the head, that is Christ<sup>23</sup>. By whom all the Body being coupled and knit together by every ligament, for the support thereof (according to the effectual power, which is in the measure of every part) receives increase of the body, unto the edifying of itself in love." Ephesians 4:11-16 (GSB)

- 1B. Apostles: apostolous / ἀποστόλους
  - 1C. The men who Jesus Himself instructed and gave this Title and miraculous powers in Matthew 10:1-10.
  - 2C. These miraculous deeds were the "signs of an Apostles" 2 Corinthians 12:12
- 2B. Prophets: prophētas / προφήτας

- 1C. The Old Testament Prophets and perhaps some in Acts. Note that Ephesians 2:20 literally reads "The Apostles who are also Prophets."
- 2C. Jesus and the Apostles who are also Prophets, are the foundation upon which you are built."
- 3C. Evangelists and Pastor-Teachers preach ONLY ON THIS FOUNDATION!
- 3B. Evangelists: euangelistas / εὐαγγελιστάς
  Men who announce the good news of Jesus Christ: Missionaries.
- 4B. Pastors who are Teachers (the literal Greek phrase): poimenas / ποιμένας
   didaskalous / διδασκάλους
  - 1C. Pastor or Shepherd feeds Sheep. They feed by Teaching.
  - 2C. Several words describe their office:
    - 1D. 1 Timothy 3:1-2, "the office of a bishop" or literally "Episcopos /  $\epsilon\pi i\sigma\kappa o\pi o\varsigma$ " means Overseer or a Foreman on a job site.
    - 2D. Titus 1:5-9, Bishops are Elders, or "Presbuteros / πρεσβύτερος" literally "Older Ones." Paul did not appoint "New Converts!"
    - 3D. Acts 20:17, Elders are Overseers (in v.20) and ARE Pastors/ Shepherds.
- 5B. The Bible sees no other Leaders over a local Church. They are simply:
  - 1C. Elders "Presbuteros / πρεσβύτερος" (Older Ones or Presbyters)
  - 2C. Overseers "Episcopos / ἐπίσκοπος" (Ones who keep an eye on things)
  - 3C. Pastor/Shepherds (One who feeds and protects Sheep).
    - 1D. Note that they are a GROUP of Men and never "a man" alone.
    - 2D. The man among them that receives special training is simply an Elder or "Pastor who is also a Teacher." He ministers with the other Leaders.
- 6B. Disciple  $\mu\alpha\theta\eta\tau\eta\varsigma$  (follower): A Student/<u>Deacon</u> = diakonos / διακόνος: literally, "through the dust," is any official non-teaching ministry.
  - 1C. Acts 6:1-7
  - 2C. 1 Timothy 3:8-13



#### **ADDENDUM**

Addendum 1 - How to utilize a Concordance and/or Lexicon

- 1A. The Concordance
  - 1B. By Definition
    - 1C. A Bible Concordance (i.e., Strong's or Young's) is an index listing of words within the Bible that assigns a unique number to each Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek word, allowing for easy crossreferencing.
    - 2C. A Good Bible Concordance also includes a Hebrew and Greek Dictionary that utilizes a Reference number from the main body of the particular Bible Translation.
    - 3C. The Student would do well to memorize the Hebrew and Greek Alphabet to aid in finding the particular Hebrew and/or Greek word in the Dictionary provided.
    - 4C. The student is encouraged to download and utilize a Bible interlinear via website or app:
      - 1D. Greek only www.scripturedirect.com and/or
      - 2D. Greek and Hebrew www.biblehub.com/interlinear/
  - 2B. By Practical Steps

Utilize a Bible Concordance by following these steps:

- 1C. Obtain a Bible Concordance that utilizes your preferred Bible Translation.
- 2C. Selected a Word in the Bible Concordance Words are listed alphabetically.
- 3C. Locate the Verse and Reference number associated with the Word
- 4C. Go to the Verse utilizing the Reference number. The Bible Concordance will list your Word's Verses and Reference number.
- 5C. Review the context surrounding your Word choice.
- 6C. Research the Word's etymological root (www.etymonline.com)<sup>24</sup>
- 7C. Utilize the Hebrew and Greek Dictionary provided.
- 3B. Word to the Wise:

While a Bible Concordance can direct you to a particular word and show you how it is utilized within the Bible, it is crucial to consider its surrounding context to understand its Meaning.

## 2A. The Lexicon

- 1B. By Definition
  - 1C. A Biblical Lexicon is a reference tool that defines the Biblical meaning of words within the Bible's original languages (i.e. Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek). Lexicons are a specific type of Dictionary that helps one understand the original meaning, context and culture of Biblical words.


- 2C. Research the English etymological root. The student is encouraged to download and utilize the app at <a href="https://www.etymology.com">www.etymology.com</a>.
- 3C. Lexicon Types
  - 1D. Hebrew-Aramaic lexicons cover the words of the Old Testament.
  - 2D. Greek lexicons cover the words of the New Testament.
